Historical Society plans another **Trivia Night**

Sarah found a job at the Alliance Area Domestic Violence Shelter, where she had worked previously in college and briefly after graduation.


Sarah currently works at the Ohio Domestic Violence Network as the relocation program coordinator.

The Alliance Historical Society marked its Founders' Day by paying tribute to a man who spent more time on its board than anyone else in its history. A small group gathered inside Haggart Hall at the Alliance YWCA on Thursday, June 29 - the exact site of the first meeting of the Alliance Historical Society on that date in 1939 - to pay homage to Joe Zelasko. A retired teacher who spent 44 years in the Alliance City School District, Zelasko was a member of the board for 52 of the Society's 84 years, serving since April of 1971. Zelasko had announced he was stepping down earlier this year.

GIVE Alliance 365 grant will help create East Main Street self-guided tour

Thanks to a grant from the Greater Alliance Foundation's GIVE Alliance 365 Fund, the Alliance Historical Society and the Alliance Area Preservation Society will establish an East Main Street Historic District Walking Tour.

With the \$3,375 grant, the historic groups will place 25 to 30 permanent signposts along the East Main Street Historic District, which was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2017.

Each signpost will include a stop number, name of the stop, and a QR code. When the QR code is scanned with a smart phone, the user will be directed to the Clio history website for narrative (audio and written), photographs, and maps of the building or lot.

Some signs will be mounted to the building, some will have new signposts installed, and some will be placed on existing street signposts.

The tour will replicate previous guided tours that featured temporary paper signs and display boards along the path at various stops. However with the use of the QR codes and the Clio app, the tours will be self-guided and will be perfect for tourists and residents alike visiting downtown Alliance.

The project was among 17 proposed to GIVE Alliance 365 for support and among eight chosen to receive funding in 2023.

The GIVE Alliance 365 Fund is supported by donors who contribute a "dollara-day" to make a difference in their community.

However, the three will work in concert and in consultation to share resources with one another, to improve communication within the organizations and throughout the community, and to support each other's efforts and initiatives in every way possible.

Those efforts will include sharing human and physical resources, coordinating event scheduling and school tours, and the copromotion and marketing for community event and tourism initiatives.

The venture includes the possibility of establishing a joint endowment and a possible future consolidation.

Born to a staunch Quaker family in Smith Township, Mahoning County, Levi Rakestraw Lupton became a land speculator in Michigan, founded Alliance's First Friends Church, established a controversial Pentecostal encampment just outside Alliance in Washington Township, and experienced a highly publicized fall from grace in 1910.

The arbor and tool shed in the back yard at the Mabel Hartzell Historical home are now in great shape thanks to Seth Dillon, who took on the challenge as his Eagle Scout project.

Seth, along with seven other Scouts and six adults, worked a total of 66 hours

They scraped old and chipping paint off the arbor and shed before painting. Only one face of the shed was in need of new paint because of vines growing up the one side.

"This project will have a positive impact on the community because the Mabel Hartzell home is an important part of Alliance history," said Seth, "and any project that helps to maintain this home will make it more inviting for people to come and learn more about the city."

To take on the project, Seth first picked a date that would work best, received a donation of paint and painting supplies from Lowe's, then asked to borrow several tools from people to be used for led by Seth Dillon, completing the project. He organized the other volunteers and had any expenses covered by his family.

Throughout the entire project, Seth worked alongside his volunteers.
